Course overview

This exciting and experimental course explores contemporary painting processes and surfaces, testing and discovering new material languages in paint. You will expand and develop your understanding of what paint can do, and the specific material qualities of paints, contextualised with contemporary artists and movements, and your own individual subjects and themes. You will investigate how various paints (including spray paints, encaustic wax, gloss paints, acrylics) feel and handle and how to use them. You will also explore the interaction of paint with other surfaces such as found objects and photo transfer.

Learning Outcomes

Students will be able to:

Analyse the work of others and apply findings to their own work Create experimental paintings using different media and surfaces. Research, plan and realise a self initiated project. Apply safe-working practices at all times.

What Level is the course and do I need any particular skills?

This course is suitable for all levels. You should be open to experimentation and questioning.

About your tutor

Alison Hand is the BA Fine Art Programme Leader at Art Academy London. She has an MA in Painting from the Royal College of Art, and is currently the Artist in Residence with Kings College London Philosophy department exploring new research into dreams and wakeful consciousness. She is a published writer on art and architecture, the latest project being a 6,000 word article on contemporary drawing for Bloomsbury publishers. Hand's paintings and drawings have won many awards including the Basil H Alkazzi Scholarship; the Gordon Luton Award for Fine Art; and the Stephenson Harwood Award.

Weekly breakdown

Below is a weekly breakdown of what will be covered. Please bear in mind that these sessions will move with the pace of the group, so a degree of flexibility of what will be covered on which day will be employed.

Wk	Date	Topic/Activity	Location & Tutor(s)	What to bring
1	Wednesday 15th January 2025	Transparency and painting as collage In this first week we will be using acetate as a painting surface, exploring the transparency and plastic sheen. Starting with a presentation and group discussion, we will explore how to break habitual approaches to composition through the use of collage and source material in painting. We will then work on sheets of clear acetate, utilising the transparency to create layered, double sided works, which employ the quick drying nature and stretch of acrylic paint; the 'utopian' colours and soft edges of spray paint; and the glossiness and dense coverage of household paints. Brushwork and flatness is very apparent on clear plastic surfaces, and these gestural and non-gestural techniques can be considered and utilised. Also please bring acrylic paints with you and decent brushes, of all sizes
2	Wednesday 22nd January 2025	Spray paints and stencils This week we will start with a presentation of artists who use spray paint in painting. Then we will make our own stencils and work with spray paints in this way combined with freehand techniques.	Alison Hand Mermaid court Studio 1	Surfaces to paint on, ie MDF boards, canvases, etc - if possible not canvas boards. Also bring acrylic paints, mediums, and brushes.
3	Wednesday 29th January 2025	Photo transfer and paint This week we will use the photo-transfer technique to transfer images to surfaces, and then work into and on them with paint.	Alison Hand Mermaid court Studio 1	As above plus photocopies for photo-transfer
4	Wednesday 5th February 2025	Encaustic wax painting This week we will be using heated encaustic wax as a medium for painting, mixing paint with it and creating semi transparent layers. This is a lovely medium which can be gestural and delicate at the same time.	Alison Hand Mermaid court Studio 1	Surfaces to paint on, ie MDF boards, canvases, etc -if possible not canvas boards. Oil paints and/or dry pigments, and brushes - of all sizes including big brushes.
5	Wednesday 12th February 2025	Exploring acrylics - layers and subtlety Acrylic paints have wonderful properties. You will explore these by working in two different ways with them. This first week we will build up a series of very thin layers of acrylic washes to create density, subtlety, colour, and depth, with painting 'incidents' (images or abstract forms) located on different layers, thereby creating a sense of space, ambiguity, and intrigue within a very flat surface. 6	Wednesday 26th February 2025	Exploring acrylics and oils - masking techniques, flatness and plasticity, juxtaposed with the language of oil paint This week we will continue with our exploration of acrylic paint, this time employing its flat plasticity and the disappearance of brushwork and gesture, using tape to mask edges and areas. We will layer flat areas of forms and colour to discover how to create a sense of space and hard edged vibrancy. We will also combine this with the luscious effects of oil paint sitting on top of the acrylic, trying out techniques such as blurring. 7	Wednesday 5th March 2025	Responding to found surfaces This week we are exploring and playing with the actual surface, so our painting surface / support becomes as much a part of the artwork as the paint. In using the surface as a medium, we need to consider the material properties, language, and associations of the surfaces we use. In preparation, you will find suitable and exciting surfaces to use, which may be irregular, found objects, or fragments - and will work with them to draw out their material qualities, adding to or subverting them via their painted interventions.	Alison Hand Mermaid court Studio 1	A range of surfaces as described left. We will discuss this the preceding week. Acrylic and oil paints, mediums, and brushes - of all sizes including big brushes			
8	Wednesda y 12th March 2025	Painting as process The day will begin with a group discussion of painters who use process as the primary element in their work, considering how they utilise the material language of paint, as affected by time, movement, repetition, and chance, to create paintings. We will then make our own paintings which explore the idea of process as form, investigating the properties of traditional oil paint and 'household' paints - pouring, dripping, scraping, erasing, and the potential temporal qualities of paint, creating something which is unfixed and changes over time. We will make our own painting devices to extend our range outside the paintbrush. 9	Wednesda y 19th March 2025	Personal project These last two weeks students can develop their own personal project drawing on themes explored in the course. 10	Wednesda y 26th March 2025	Personal project These last two weeks students can develop their own personal project drawing on themes explored in the course.	Alison Hand Mermaid court Studio 1	Surfaces to paint on, ie MDF boards, canvases, etc. Acrylic and oil paints, mediums, and brushes, of all sizes including big brushes.			

The Academy is a white spirit and turpentine free environment and only odourless spirits, such as Zest-it or Sansodor, are permitted on the premises. Students must provide their own spirits, which can be recycled for longevity.

We request that you bring 2 small jars (one with a lid, one without) to hold your spirit, and a few cloths rags for brush cleaning (such as an old cotton t-shirt).

Additional Costs

There will be a cost of £10 per student to cover acetates, spray paints, and some household paints, that the Academy will provide. This is payable at the start of the course.

Materials and equipment students need to provide

A good range of brushes - small to large.

Acrylic paints and Oil paints.

Any paints/paint products that the students have and may wish to experiment with; household paints, watercolour, thickening mediums etc.

Initial introduction materials and tools will be provided by the academy, subsequent materials will be sourced and/or paid for by students.

You will need to bring your own painting materials to the class. If you do not have your own materials, we recommend you order an **Oil Painting Pack** or **Acrylic Painting Pack** at the time of booking, which will be available when you arrive for your first class.
